Mr. Downs agreed to contact the company relative to shortening the term of franchise. Mr. Ayre was asked to supervise installation of pipe for drainage. Upon completion of street drainage work now under way, Mr. Stewart Bryce is to be billed for pipe in the amount of \$4.00, and Mr. J. B. Cross in the amount of \$6.00. It was decided that no further action would be taken to recover pipe and tar lent to Mr. Basil Ambler several years ago, since the facts were no longer evident.

The auditors' report for the past fiscal year submitted by Mrs. Robert Buckley and Mr. R. Eughett was accepted by the council; this report showed a balance of \$879.27.

The mayor read a letter dated November 6 from the Commonwealth of Virginia relaive to the aims of the Citizens' Food Committee; also letter dated October 23 from the Virginia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

Councilmen Buckley and Detwiler brought up the question of exhorbitant charges for milk in the state, and Mr. Buckley was asked to investigate with the milk commission in Richmond and advise the next meeting of his findings.

The mayor advised that letters were being sent to the following citizens thanking them for cooperation on Hallowe'en as deputies: Col. Quinn, J. Hart, Harry Sutphin, Carlton Smith, W. Pearson, J. Robey. Letters have already gone out to the county police chief and members of his staff who served in the town on that day.

Mr. Buckley reported that in the campaign to enlist supporters for the Monticello Highway the local committee had collected \$327.00 in payments and pledges, to be used for defraying expenses.

There being no further business to come before the meeting it stood adjourned at 9 p.m.
